



WELLBEING

Restorative Practice at Kingsmead School to enhance what we do.

At Kingsmead School, we have made a conscious decision to move away from traditional punitive measures in our behaviour management system. Instead, we are focusing on a restorative approach that emphasises understanding, reflection, and reparation when students do not meet our established rules and standards.

This shift has resulted in a significant reduction in repeated offences, as students increasingly grasp the reasoning behind their behaviours through reflective processes. By implementing initiatives such as 'Shield and Shelter', our anti-bullying initiative, we not only address harmful behaviours but also foster a supportive environment conducive to every pupil's growth.

The Five Key Benefits of Restorative Practice at Kingsmead

It Promotes Understanding and Accountability

Through restorative practices, pupils are encouraged to reflect on their actions and their impact on others. This promotes a deeper understanding of the consequences of behaviour, leading to increased accountability. Pupils understanding this at Kingsmead School is pivotal in cultivating an atmosphere where students effectively learn from their mistakes.

It Enhances Relationships

Restorative practice aims to repair and strengthen relationships between students and staff, as well as among peers. By focusing on dialogue and mutual respect, we encourage students to engage in a constructive manner, thereby adding to a more harmonious school community.

It Empowers Students

Involving pupils in the restorative process empowers them to take responsibility for their actions and to have a voice in resolving conflicts. This empowerment provides a sense of ownership over their behaviour, making them less likely to repeat negative actions.

It Reduces Recidivism

Our observations at Kingsmead indicate that the restorative approach significantly lowers the chances of repeat offences. Students involved in reflection and reparation tend to reoffend less, as they come to understand the impact of their actions on others while working towards making amends.


It Promotes a Positive School Culture

By prioritising restorative practices, we contribute to a culture of respect and inclusivity. This approach not only aids in managing issues such as discrimination, aggression, and defiance but also aligns with our values as an institution committed to fairness and equality.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

Revise Right: Effective Revision for Students and Parents

We have been recently doing work around effective revision strategies in preparation for the year 11 and 13 mocks. These are useful for all of our students as we approach the end of year assessments. With the right strategies, you can make your revision more effective, boost your memory, and achieve those top grades. And parents, you play a crucial role in supporting your child's revision journey too.

Memory and Learning

Understanding how your memory works is key to successful revision. When you learn something new, it goes into your working memory, which can only hold a limited amount of information for a short time. To make that information stick, you need to transfer it to your long-term memory through effective learning strategies. Consistent practice and revisiting material strengthen memory and boosts learning.

What to do - Active Revision Techniques

- Retrieval Practice: Instead of just re-reading notes, actively recall information from memory. This could involve knowledge quizzes, multiple-choice tests, past papers, or flashcards.
- Flashcards: Flashcards are a great tool for low-stakes testing to improve recall and strengthen memory. Create flashcards with key terms, definitions, dates, or even past paper questions. Use the Leitner System: test yourself daily on Box 1 cards, move correct answers to Box 2 (tested twice a week), and then to Box 3 (tested once a week).



- Spacing and Interleaving: Space out your revision into smaller chunks over time to help you remember the material better and reduce stress. Interleaving involves switching between different topics during a study session to strengthen memory.
- Deliberate Practice: Review a topic, then test yourself without notes to identify knowledge gaps. Focus future revision on these areas.
 - Active Revision: Practice with past paper questions. On the Blended Learning Platform, question banks of past paper questions are available. When using Seneca, the "Exam Prep" feature is a decent way to get active practice in or search specific areas on SparxMaths.

What to Avoid - Ineffective Revision

- Passive Revision: Avoid simply writing out notes, copying from textbooks, or highlighting without actively engaging with the material.
- Comfort Zone Revision: Don't just revise easy material that you already know well. Focus on challenging topics to improve your understanding.



- Multitasking: Give tasks enough silent work or attention. Avoid attempting to revise while multitasking.
- Focusing on too much information: Avoid trying to focus on too much information on a single page and cramming revision.

Tips for Parents

- Create a Supportive Environment: Ensure your child has a quiet, comfortable place to study with minimal distractions.
- Encourage Breaks: Remind your child to take regular breaks to avoid burnout. Short, frequent breaks can help maintain concentration and reduce stress.
- Be Positive: Offer encouragement and celebrate your child's progress, no matter how small. Positive reinforcement can boost their confidence and motivation.

The Year 10 highflyers had a great experience visiting the University of Oxford!



ATTENDANCE

Absence protocols being adhered to from parents/guardians are essential to maintain a structured and supportive learning environment.

Our key priority is to ensure that your child is as successful as possible during their time at Kingsmead and that they can achieve their full potential.

These protocols outline the procedures to undertake when your child is going to be Absent or Late.

Notification of Absence:

Please promptly contact the school before 8:30am, by calling 01543 227373 or 01543 227320. If you are unable to get through, please leave a voicemail clearly stating the name of your child, year group, the reason for absence and your relationship to the child and be assured that this will be picked up as soon as possible.

Lates:

School starts at 8:25am, please aim to get your children to school between 8:00 – 8:20am where all students are entitled to a free breakfast from 8am.

Wet weather days, bin days or roadworks, please aim to leave 5-10 minutes earlier to ensure that your child arrives on time.

If your child is going to be late, please call 01543 227373 or 01543 227320.

Documentation:

In cases for absences related to any appointments during school time, we will request some form of evidence of this to authorise the absence. An example of this would be a photo of a medical letter that shows the child's name and date/time of the appointment. This can be emailed to KS-Attendance@kingsmeadschool.net

Term time holidays:

The Department for Education has made important changes to the law for families wanting to request leave of absence in term time. The changes make it clear that head teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time.

You may be subject to a Penalty Charge Notice if your child's absence from school is unauthorised. This is in line with Staffordshire County Councils Code of Conduct and the "Working Together to Improve School Attendance" statutory guidance (effective 19th August 2024).

If there are exceptional circumstances, we may consider this, however, please ask your child to collect a 'Request of Leave of Absence' form from the attendance office. Once this has been completed and returned to the attendance office, a decision will be made, and Parents/Guardians will be contacted with the outcome.

Model UN Conference - March 2025

On Saturday 8th March 2025 eight keen Kingsmead students dedicated their Saturday to attend the prestigious Model United Nations (MUN) Conference at Concord College. They showcased their innovation, resilience, debate, and problem-solving skills on an international stage in front of other competing schools.

Before the event students were given a country to act on behalf of and conducted in depth research into the geopolitical affairs of the country. Each student selected a committee to attend on the day and was given a real-life global affair to try to solve. Students prepared solutions and speeches to help with their success on the day.

During the event, students delivered speeches and engaged in rigorous discussions, defending their viewpoints and working collaboratively with others to refine resolutions. This challenging process required critical thinking, negotiation skills, and a deep understanding of international affairs.

In the afternoon, all participants took part in a Model General Council meeting, where the most pressing resolutions were debated at a larger scale. This provided a fantastic opportunity for students to demonstrate their ability to articulate their points clearly and persuasively in a high-pressure environment.

The team's hard work and preparation paid off, as they achieved an impressive second place overall. This is an especially significant achievement considering they were the only public school in attendance. Additionally, several students earned individual awards for their outstanding contributions, further highlighting their excellence in debate and diplomacy.


