## **LEARNING AND TEACHING**

Celebrating Excellent Teaching – Learning and Teaching Team

At Kingsmead, excellence in teaching and learning is not just a goal but a daily reality, as evidenced by the dynamic, engaging lessons observed across departments this term. Our teachers consistently demonstrate strong subject knowledge, effective pedagogy, and high expectations, ensuring all of our students achieve their best.

In classrooms this term, we have observed teachers using high-level questioning techniques to keep every student actively involved. Encouraging students to elaborate on their answers and make connections to prior learning, teachers foster critical thinking and deeper understanding. For instance, in Psychology, students could confidently explain complex concepts like ecological validity and its application in research studies in preparation for mock examinations.

Year 11 lessons were observed to be meticulously designed to align with exam requirements. Teachers leverage their deep understanding of specifications and mark schemes, preparing students with resources like summary sheets, mini-tests, and model answers to ensure they are prepared for mock examinations. An example of this was seen in Chemistry, the use of mini whiteboards for targeted questioning and immediate feedback against the mark scheme from teachers ensured students' fully understood different question types.



Our focus as a staff body has been on structured talk: using talk as a tool for thinking. One example of this was seen in Year 7 History where students' were learning about the different claimants to the throne in 1066. Year 7s were tasked with understanding the characteristics of a strong King during this time and then collecting data on the claimants together. Students were split into pairs and collected data on two of the four claimants, then feeding back to their partner to ensure all the data is collected. Then, using this new knowledge, students were asked to evaluate the strongest claimant to the throne together, using sentence stems that were designed to stimulate structured discussion.

Whilst visiting different lessons, feedback from students reinforces the value of these strategies. They appreciate the high expectations, engaging lessons, and the support provided for them to excel. At Kingsmead, we continue to aim to keep getting better: creating inspiring environments where students thrive. As a community, we celebrate this shared commitment to excellence in teaching and learning.



#### CAREERS



As we prepare for the festivities to begin: All we want for Christmas is you! It's true, we really do! As part of this term's edition of the newsletter, we're asking for your help and support at our up-coming careers events in 2025.

On 12th February, we will have our annual Futures Fayre. With a wide range of employers, universities, colleges and training providers coming into school, our Sports Hall will buzz with excitement as students have discussions with representatives their future pathways and potential careers. Alongside this, to give a realistic view on careers, we will also have a "meet the professional" section, where students can speak to individuals about their own careers, the good and the bad bits!

Please spread the message far and wide to anyone who would like to attend, either on behalf of the company they work for, or as themselves to speak about the role they do. #### ENRICHMENT

At Kingsmead, our Art History Enrichment offers students the opportunity to delve into the fascinating world of art, exploring how it shapes and reflects society. Recently, we have focused on the concept of value in art, analysing the ground-breaking work of Damien Hirst. His controversial pieces, such as The Physical Impossibility of Death in the Mind of Someone Living—a tiger shark suspended in formaldehyde—challenge traditional notions of beauty and provoke discussion on how fame, materials, and context influence an artwork's worth.

We have also explored the emotive and conceptual pieces of Tracy Emin and Marina Abramović, two iconic figures in contemporary art. Emin's My Bed offers a raw and intimate glimpse into her personal life, transforming the mundane into a poignant commentary on vulnerability and self-expression. Similarly, Abramović's performance piece, The Artist is Present, where she sat silently across from visitors for hours on end, explores endurance, human connection, and the power of presence. These works have sparked rich debates among our students, prompting them to think critically about art as an experience rather than just an object.







Studying Art History teaches students to analyse, interpret, and engage with the world in new ways. It helps them understand cultural contexts, express their opinions, and appreciate diverse perspectives. As one student remarked, "I love learning about artists like Hirst and Emin. They make me see art differently—it's not just paintings, but ideas and emotions." Another added, "Art History teaches me to ask questions about everything, not just art. It's inspiring!"

Through this programme, students gain not only an appreciation for art but also transferable skills such as critical thinking, creativity, and empathy—preparing them for a lifetime of learning and discovery.

## SAFEGUARDING Spotlight

#### Safeguarding spotlight on sharing images

Online sexualised activity has increased among young people. Unfortunately, what they don't always understand or consider when getting involved in this type of behaviour, are the risks, consequences and impact sharing and posting sexual content of themselves can have when things get out of hand and goes wrong.

'Sexting' is the exchange of self-generated sexually explicit images and message, through mobile picture messages, web-cams over the internet. Some young people also refer to this as cybersex, sending nudes, dirty pics or naked selfies. It has become an increasingly common activity among children and young people, often considered by them as 'normal' harmless fun or flirting; what they fail to see, understand or are unaware of, is the risks and potential consequences that come with this activity.

#### How to protect your child:

- Talk to your child: It is important to ensure they understand the risks of 'sexting' advise them about staying safe, future impact and reassure them they can talk to you if something ever makes them feel uncomfortable, worried or things go wrong for them. The NSPCC provides guidance for parents on how to approach the conversation.
- Learn together: CEOP has produced some excellent resources, these can be found on the Thinkuknow website.
- Reassure your child: Let your child know that you are always there to support them if they feel worried or pressured by anyone, or if a situation they get involved in gets out of hand they can come to you.



#### WELLBEING

We have had a very busy, jam-packed Autumn term in Kingsmead's Wellness Hub. We have had the pleasure of supporting our new (now not so new!) Year 7 students settle in and find their feet in secondary school. We have continued to run our successful Image-in-Me and He-motions wellbeing intervention groups as well as our 6th form and Year 11 drop-in sessions. Alongside our Performing Arts students, we have worked closely with our primary partners delivering an Anti-bullying performance and workshop to over 300 pupils and we continue to work tirelessly supporting our students daily with one-to-one mentoring, our shield and shelter programme and restorative support sessions.

As we come towards our Christmas break, we thought it most appropriate to dedicate our section this term to talk about keeping well over the festive period. Whilst Christmas is pitched as 'The Most Wonderful Time of the Year', we recognise that it is not always this way for many of us, and it is more important than ever to look after your mental health and wellbeing during this time.

We ask you to stay kind and mindful to one another during this time. You do not always know someone's story and experiences but what you can do is help by staying compassionate and offering a helping hand to those that may need it.

Well done, Charlie! We are incredibly proud of you and your achievements






