

Newsletter – Half Term 1

Dear parents and carers,

I wanted to thank you all personally for your support over the last half-term. Feedback from our local community about the excellent behaviour of our children when they are out and about has been lovely to receive, and is often down to the choices and lessons that you pass on as parents.

Thank you all for all that you do to work with us as a school!

Some important notices for the next half-term:

1. Keeping children safe and really knowing your child – From the Safeguarding Team

Probably one of the best things for us all about the lockdown was talking more to our children. It is something that even now we need to work at, thinking of ways that we can try to really understand what they feel and what they do when we are not with them.

To help keep our children safe please continue to be vigilant about where your child is during the October half-term and after school. We have wonderful students who almost always live the Kingsmead values of resilience, innovation, mindfulness, and employability, but you cannot always control who they might encounter when they are out and about on their own.

To keep them safe please consider talking to your child about areas in the local community to avoid and what to do if they are approached by someone that they do not know. 2. Progress Reviews – putting parents at the heart of learning – Save the Date

One of the most important events in your child's learning journey at Kingsmead will be the three Progress Reviews that your child will undertake this school year. It enables parents to be actively involved in their child's learning and encourages the students to critically reflect on their strengths and areas for development across their subjects, setting SMART targets that are agreed by the child, parent and Progress Tutor.

The first Progress Review will be on **Wednesday, 23rd November.** Mr. Truby has sent out a letter on Parentpay detailing the process for Progress Reviews. Information on how to book appointments will follow after half-term. Please refer to this for more information and contact your child's Progress Leader with any queries you may have.

3. Sixth Form Open Evening – Save the Date!

Calling all Year 11 students, your future awaits! On <u>Thursday, 17th November</u> Kingsmead's exceptional, area-leading Sixth Form will throw its doors wide open for you to come and find out everything you need to know to help you make your subject choices for Year 12. The Glasshouse, Sixth Form Centre and E Block will be open from 4:30 until 6:30 for you to speak to specialist staff and gather information and details about all of the 30+ Key Stage 5 courses Kingsmead Sixth Form has to offer. Whether you are considering University or an apprenticeship, Kingsmead Sixth Form has the broadest offer in the area of academic and vocational qualifications, don't miss out!



Immediately following Open Evening, applications will open for next year's cohort and places are very competitive, so make sure you come along and find out everything you can!

4. Student Grievances – No stone left unturned

We have had a positive start to our new Student Grievance programme at Kingsmead. It has enabled parents to feel more informed of an issue that their child may have experienced with another peer, encouraging important questions and conversations to be had.

It has allowed Progress Leaders to ascertain more accurate information about a grievance and has built confidence amongst our students on the support they will receive if needed. If your child experiences a grievance of any kind with a peer, they should come and collect a Grievance Form from the Progress Hub and fill this in with parents at home in the first instance, handing it to their Progress Leader when it has been completed. Thank you for your continued support.

So far, the response from students and parents has been very positive to the process, but if you have suggestions for making the process even better, please do get in touch.

5. Supporting Staff – Respect – I need your help

Thank you to the many parents who ensure that interactions with staff are almost always positive and supportive. The times that you take a moment to send an email or a message to thank staff means more than we can say. There are however some adults where the increased stresses and worries across the country seem to be influencing their interactions with school.

This is manifesting in a very small number of people who behave in an aggressive or abusive way. I know that every reasonable and supportive parent would agree that staff at Kingsmead work incredibly hard and always try their best for the children in our care.

It is with some sadness that I find myself having to say that there is no valid reason to make staff feel abused, threatened, or distressed in their place of work. Please support me by making sure that all interactions are conducted in a manner of mutual respect.

We are here to support each other with the children at the centre of all that we try to do. We will always listen, we may not always agree, but for those who need to hear this - please work with us. Children excel when their school and parents work together and are united.

6. Laptops in Lessons - enriching learning

Students should be encouraged wherever possible to **bring their laptop into school** to support their learning in lessons and via the '**Blended Learning Platform'**.

Please reassure students, they **do not need to wait for their teachers to ask them to bring in their laptops**, students should be confident they can use their laptop in the vast majority of their lessons freely to support their learning. An exception to this would be if students are completing handwritten assessments at the end of a learning cycle. Please contact your Progress Leader if you have any questions regarding laptops or Blended Learning.



7. Calculators in Maths

In the Maths Department, we encourage pupils to bring their own calculators, the model we recommend is a Casio FX85 GTX which works up to and including GCSE. Two out of the three GCSE Maths papers are calculator papers and learning to use a calculator efficiently can gain a significant number of extra marks in exams, on average around 20 marks. You can purchase a calculator directly via Parentpay through school at a small saving compared to shops – what a great idea for a Christmas gift!

8. New toilets are on their way - Who would have thought that toilets were so exciting

1 week after half term the new toilet block will be opening near to the exotic classroom. Straight after this work will start on our third new block near to maths. We will share pictures of the ribbon being cut in the next newsletter.

In other facilities news we're having some work done on the fencing at the top of school alongside Wood Lane to create a safe drop-off and pick-up point for parents, keeping roads clearer, pedestrians safer and being mindful of our neighbours. This will be ready in the coming months.

9. Cost of Living Crisis – We are in this together

As a school we are trying to do everything that we can to support parents and children at this difficult time. As the cost of living continues to rise, we have looked at the different ways that we can support our Kingsmead family.

When looking within the school community we identified different areas in which we could cut costs. For example, we know how much families value school photos each year, however the cost of these can soon add up. Therefore, this year we have taken these photos in house with our resident photographer Mr. Summers. This has allowed us to dramatically cut costs for parents whilst also provided more individualised photos. The feedback from parents has been fantastic. Below is one message from a Year 7 parent that we wanted to share:

Good afternoon,

I just wanted to email to say that I received my son's year 7 school photos and I have to say they are great, it's so nice that they are so much more affordable, more fun and it's lovely having a selection as I normally have to just choose the one as they are so expensive and I have 2 children at high school.

1.Hardship Fund

As you will know, we recently conducted a sponsored walk to raise money for our in-house hardship fund. This fund is designed to help those in crisis with support towards the cost of uniform, equipment and trips.

2. Kingsmead Pre-Loved

On the 16th August, a pop-up pre-loved stall will take place within school where all sorts of items such as uniform, equipment, text books etc. will available for you to purchase for reduced price/donation. 3. Discounted Food Apps



KINGSMEAD HARDSHIP FUND 2022/23

OVERVIEW

The Hardship Fund is a discretionary source of financial help available to all registered full-time Kingsmead students.

The aim of the fund is to help students who have difficulties in paying for:

- Curriculum trips, visits, year group residential courses and other activities (The amount covered will be agreed upon depending upon circumstances, cost of the trip as well as time until trip departs)
- Uniform, shoes, or sports kit
- Other materials or equipment to assist in academic studies
- Other necessary expenses

Payments from the Fund are discretionary and if awarded do not need to be repaid.

Limited resources are available from the Hardship Fund. Funds are topped up through fundraising and voluntary contributions. Donations of school uniform to the fund are welcomed (please note: the current logo is in place for another 12 months so the purchasing of brand-new uniform is not necessary at this point)

ELIGIBILITY

The Academy will consider hardship fund applications in relation to the following groups:



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1. Parents/Carers in receipt of benefits which qualify for Free School Meals:

- Income Support
- Income-Based Jobseekers' Allowance
- Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit, but not Working Tax Credit, with an annual income below £16,190
- Guarantee Element of the State Pension Credit.
- Working Tax Credit 'run-on' the payment someone may receive for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit

2. Students:

- Who have disabilities
- Who are in care, or who have left care
- Who live alone outside the family home
- Who have a very low family income
- Proof of Benefit is required. Proof must be in letter form and:
- Must have been issued within the last six months
- Must show the family address given
- Must be included with the grant application.

Bank statements, incapacity, housing and council tax benefit are not valid proof.

If you are experiencing hardship and do not fall into the categories above, please contact your Miss Force to discuss your exceptional circumstances.

APPLICATION PROCESS

An application should be made through the member of staff detailed on the application form. The application must remain confidential and will be considered by Miss Force given their knowledge of the student's circumstances.

If approved by Miss Force, the application will be passed to the Headteacher and the Finance Director for review and final approval.

A student may be able to apply for hardship support at any time during the academy year. It is possible to apply more than once, but usually only where circumstances have changed – approval of one application does not necessarily mean that further applications will be approved. Students and their families cannot appeal a decision not to award a hardship grant as the Headteacher and Finance Director's decision is final.

Payments from the hardship fund would normally be 'in-kind' e.g. direct provision of uniform or sports kit, materials and equipment, or by contribution towards trip and visit expenses. Applications for hardship support towards activities taking place in the future (e.g., curriculum trips) will not routinely be approved until close to the time of the activity. This prevents the Academy from committing itself to financial support that may not be require.



Please note that if your child is in receipt of Pupil Premium then there is already support in place for the provision of uniform and payments towards trip. Please be advised that additional support through the Hardship Fund will be limited.
